International Status Report

On March 16, 1994, the day after the Lenten Desert Experience, President Clinton extended the nuclear testing moratorium through Sept. 1995. By extending the moratorium, Clinton has enhanced the positive atmosphere for the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty (CTBT) negotiations currently underway in Geneva. The U.S. is pushing for a rapid conclusion to CTBT negotiations. Meanwhile on the hill, Rep. Bilbray (D-NV) introduced on May 3 an amendment to the Defense Authorization Bill, cutting the nuclear testing budget from \$180 to \$150 million.

Conference on Disarmament (CD): In a meeting with a delegation of representatives of anti-nuclear groups, Mexican Ambassador to the CD, Miguel Marin-Bosch (chair of the Ad-Hoc Committee on a Nuclear Test Ban), stated that he hopes to have a treaty in hand by the end of the year. The CD concluded its first session on March 31, will begin its second session on May 16 and continue to July 1, and will start its third session on July 25, concluding on Sept. 7. Ambassador Marin-Bosch said that "if need be, we will work through the General Assembly [session in the fall] to make sure we have a treaty by the beginning of next year. LDE XIII, Now Is The Time

LDE XIII was my first visit back to the desert for an NDE event since 1991. It was good to be back with some 125 others who came to Las Vegas to visit the test site, get informed, study scripture, and worship together. Many slept in the "uncomfortable inn" of their sleeping bags, in a little space, yet life stories were shared and community was formed.

We watched David Brown's new 90 minute version of Bound By The Wind. Ched Myers broke open the scriptures and spoke about the temptations of security, power and superiority that lead us away from God and toward the bomb. Ian Zabarte articulated well the sense of sacredness that his people, the Western Shoshone, have for Mother Earth. Their concern for all victims of nuclear testing extends from human beings to animal and

plant life as well as the earth itself. Pamela Meidell brought us up to date with current events and strategies being used by national and international disarmament groups and governments toward achieving a CTBT. We may be only months away, but we must keep focused and informed! Tim Carpenter reminded us that learning to get our message out through the media is an important part of our work to end nuclear testing. (See follow-ups on Pamela's and Tim's pre-

The Nevada Desert Experience launched its City Correspondence Campaign at our March 13th gathering in Las Vegas with a workshop entitled, "Why We Can't Wait to Go Home and Spread the News." The workshop was organized to recruit NDE activists to return home and begin to write press releases and to contact local media with our call for a Comprehensive Test Ban. International Update, continued

July 1 - 25: This time period between the second and third sessions of the CD will be crucial for raising public awareness and keeping the issue alive. Groups around the world will be observing July 25, the opening date of the third session, as an International Day of Action. A campaign is underway to collect one million signatures and present them to the CD at the beginning of the third session. Major demonstrations are already planned for Geneva and Paris. We are encouraging people to plan local events on this day, and to include this campaign in Hiroshima/Nagasaki events around the world.

Russia: President Boris Yelstin recently reaffirmed his commitment to continue the nuclear testing moratorium. Russian Ambassador Vladimir Petrovsky, chair of the CD, praised President Clinton's extension of the U.S. moratorium and encouraged other nuclear states to take similar steps.

United Kingdom: The U.K. has yet to announce a formal moratorium because they test at the Nevada Test Site and the U.S. isn't testing. They do have an influential voice in the testing negotiations and are reluctant to support a treaty at this stage.

France: France maintains its moratorium on testing due entirely to the presence of President Mitterand. He announced on May 5 that the moratorium will remain in effect until May 1995, when it is likely he will be defeated in the elections. Defense Minister Leotard and the conservatives have called for between ten and twenty more tests in the South Pacific so France can reach the U.S. level of computer simulation. Mitterand believes that world opinion will prevent such massive French testing.

China: Although China has pledged not to use a nuclear weapon first, China is not abiding by any moratorium on nuclear testing. Patricia Lewis, Director of London's Verification Technology Information Centre (VERTIC), said at the end of April that she expects at least two more tests by China by the end of 1994, the first one as early as the end of May. Ambassador Marin-Bosch believes that the test could occur at the Lop-Nor test site in Xinjiang within a few weeks.
